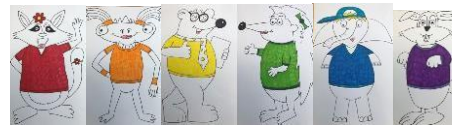

What is bullying?

A bully is someone who hurts someone else by using behaviour that is unkind and meant to hurt, cause pain, frighten or upset them. This behaviour is repeated **frequently**.



Physical: hitting, kicking, pushing, punching

Verbal: name calling, spreading rumours

Emotional: leaving you out, teasing

Online: saying unkind things by text, email or online

Racist: calling you names because of the colour of your skin

Homophobic: dislike of non-conventional family structures, improper use of the word gay

When is it bullying?
